A Note from Pastor Robin

Dear Beloved People of God,

A few years ago, I was thinking and praying about the next chapter for St. Andrews, I knew there was something there, but it was like I couldn't see through a cloud. Last month Session approved 3 goals, that have been prayerfully considered and adjusted since the vision summit in early June. With the approval of these 3 goals, I'm beginning to see through that cloud & imagine a beautiful, vibrant future.

The three goals session approved are:

- 1) By 2025, we will create balance for all adults, youth, children, and young adults to be more actively involved in discipleship activities than in committee meetings.
- 2) By 2025, each member will have a regular rhythm of inviting at least 3 people, each year, into our welcoming worshiping community.
- 3) By 2025, we will re-imagine how we use and invest in our physical and online space to bless our neighborhood, by leveraging and elevating our members' existing community relationships and partnerships.

These goals have the potential to lead us toward knowing Christ and one another, toward clear ways to invite people to draw near to God, and to share our wonderful resources, especially our building and property with our community.

Right now, I am leaning into the first goal, that calls us to focus more of our time, more of our energy on discipleship. This is a goal for myself as well. I am here two nights a week, and always for committee meetings. A few months ago, I preached on how I have gotten distracted by the business of the church through the years, yet my job is to point to Christ. This what we need. This is also what I need, to make room to have a Bible Study, or Spiritual book club. So many of you faithfully serve on committees, we need that. Yet, what is more important is that you and all of us have a place to grow together in faith. This goal of more discipleship asks us to balance our business, and asks us to imagine St. Andrews as a place you come and connect to people who know your struggles and who are walking with you, in this journey of faith.

The second goal, is one I imagine will be a 'leap of faith' for some of us. Inviting people to church, is not always an easy thing to do in this age. Thus, our goal is to find a variety of ways to make it easier... to ask someone if they would like to join you in serving a free noon meal. Or to send a postcard, sharing our advent worship services, with a personal note that says something like: you are always welcome to join me. Or to give someone a book, with a bookmark for a book group conversation that considers our faith. This is a part of extending Christ's welcome, and also seeing where people are and asking if we can walk with them.

The third, is an echo of a desire I have heard since I came to St. Andrews, to use our space well! Every time, I am with a gathering of new members we take a tour, and every time someone says: *I had no idea, we had all this great space!* It is time to extend our welcome, by extending our connections. Many of you are actively involved in our community, what groups do you know of who might like to use some of this space well? How can our space, inside and out and even online be a blessing to our community and a blessing to our congregation as we get to know more and more of our neighbors?

These goals, will move us, most importantly toward discipleship. And towards a culture of inviting, as well as towards an active search for ways to use our resources and to actively connect to our community. It is wonderful to have clear goals to work towards, but this is only a joy if you will join in and be a part of it. If one or more of the goals, is a stretch for you than let me invite you to grow with us, as we seek to grow this congregation, not just in numbers but in faith.

All of this is built on the foundation of our common values: Christ first, Inviting, Joyful and Open-Minded! I will begin the month preaching on Joyful. We will save our last value 'Open-Minded" for the season of Epiphany!

In this season of Thanksgiving let us give thanks to God and ask God to lead us together as we focus on new goals. In all of these things, May God be glorified!

#### <u> Followship Small Groups – SIGN UP!!</u>

In October, we began a small group series called "<u>Follow</u>ship Groups." It's not too late to sign up!! We will meet through Lent.

The name sounds like "fellowship," a relationship to which the Holy Spirit calls the people of God—a relationship with God, and with one another. "Followship" is also about cross-carrying and following in the footsteps of Jesus.

<u>Why Are We Doing This?</u> The Mission Statement and Core Values mention building caring relationships, being welcoming and openminded in our interactions, and doing so with a joyful and fun-loving attitude. This is a step in that direction.

When and How Long Do the Followship Groups Meet? Is determined by each group; can be consistent or vary, depending upon the members' preferences. Suggestion: groups should meet twice a month for approximately one hour.

How Do I Take Part In This Opportunity? Each group that is set up now has a facilitator, but all members can take a turn in guiding the group's discussion. There is an easy plan for each meeting that has been put together! No teaching ex-



perience needed; *the only skill needed is a desire to listen to and talk with others in our church* (and eating is always good, too!)


### THE ANGEL TREE

#### LITTLE FREE PANTRY:

The pantry is being used every day. Several members put items in on a regular

basis. Thanks to everyone. If you prefer, you can place items in the bin across from the Christian Ed office. Some reminders:

Remember only <u>non-perishables</u> should be put in.

- If you are putting in canned goods, all types are welcome. If you are able, those with flip-top lids are good because some folks may not have can openers. You can put in items that are in <u>plastic jars</u>, just **no** glass jars please!
- Easily-prepared dishes such as mac & cheese or mashed potatoes are always needed. If you can find mixes that use water as an ingredient rather than milk and/or butter, those are even better.
- Tea bags, instant coffee, powdered creamer, and packs of sugar.
- Cereal of all kinds is good, but boxed milk makes it a treasure.

Tuna in foil packs and crackers can make a good lunch. Don't forget that things such as toilet paper, toothbrushes, toothpaste, Kleenex, and feminine items are also needed.



#### Mourning has Broken A Grief Support Group of Saint Andrews Church

"Who is going to carve the turkey this year? Dad always did it!" "I don't feel like decorating for Christmas, and I don't have the energy to go shopping."

"I wish I could just erase the holidays this year. I feel too empty to celebrate without my husband."

Do any of these thoughts ring true for you? It may be just a few months, or it may be several years since your loved one has died, but it seems that the holiday season will never feel quite right without our loved one. The most important thing to remember is that there is no right or wrong way to celebrate the holiday season after the death of a loved one.

It's important to set realistic expectations for yourself. You may experience both negative and positive feelings during the holidays while grieving, and that's OK. Be kind to yourself and remember that all feelings are acceptable.

It is also important to acknowledge your feelings and not to avoid them. Allow yourself to feel joy, sadness, anger... Whatever feelings come to you... It's OK. And remember that other family members will have their own unique grieving experience. No one way is right or wrong.

The Grief Support Group at Saint Andrews meets on the second Thursday of every month, usually at 2:00 PM in Cassel Chapel. We are always happy to welcome new people to our group.

Our November meeting will be held on Thursday, November, 10 at 2:00 PM. In December we will gather at the Lebanon Country Club on Thursday December 8, at 12:00 noon for our annual Christmas luncheon.

#### SESSION NOTES

The session met in the chapel at 7 PM October 4. The meeting was opened with a reading from Matt. 11:5-13, followed by prayer. In attendance were: Pr. Robin Reilly, Karen Dielmann. Carla Dowd, Karen Fedder, Stuart Juppenlatz, Kayla Lowrie, Rebecca Lister, Bill Mulligan, Penny Samuelson, Dennis Shalters, Lew Sauerwein, Rosemary Birt, Tom Shott & Marc Hamme. Rev. Anthony Price (Ministry Architects) also joined in the meeting.

Kayla reviewed the goals set by the Transformation Team and after discussion, the session approved all goals, recognizing our mission and connection to community. Rev. Price commented on how well our leaders communicate with each other and that the work thus far represents laying a foundation- an essential part of building something new involving a lot of work that is not readily evident. In the next few months, we will be working on volunteer job descriptions, staff job descriptions, working on the church database, plan community engagement and assure that the staff has a healthy balance of work and personal time.

The minutes from the last meeting were approved as part of the consent agenda. The reports from committees were made stressing highlights. The pastor's report was acknowledged. The Deacons' report was reviewed highlighting return to home communion. The Trustees report highlighted the purchase of a back-up generator and continued work on masonry and quotes for tree care.

Presbytery meeting report by Lew, Karen and Rebecca highlighted a new initiative to bring people into church, the promotion of Rebecca Lister from Inquirer to Candidate, an increase in per capita and Kristal Smith's new position of governance in the Presbytery.

Christian Ed highlighted the development of small groups: "Followship". Leaders have been identified and in person and zoom options will be available. Sign-ups were encouraged. An advent program for children and families is planned for December 4 with the theme of Story Time with St. Nick. Rob's report highlighted upcoming activities including; Pumpkin Patch & Carving, Trunk or Treat: (let Rob know if you want to participate) Rob asked for help from dinner makers and prayer.

Congregational Life looked forward to St. Andrews day on October 23 and the Dec 11 Christmas Luncheon. The committee is seeking to update the church information pamphlet. Initial investigation of an LED sign for front is under exploration.

The Mission Committee reviewed participation in mission week activities. Looking ahead for Christmas: we will continue the Angel Tree; a coat, glove, hat, pajama collection; and the alternative gift fair.

#### SESSION NOTES Cont'd

Administration & Personnel committee updated vacation policy for the office manager and similar positions. The changes were approved by the session.

Marc Hamme reviewed the revenue report. Stuart Juppenlatz reminded everyone that budgets were due today. There will be a budget review meeting next Monday. There may be an adjustment to the projections of internet/technology budgets to address current problems in reception. The session will be kept informed and vote as appropriate. Stewardship Sunday is October 16.

The Nominating Committee has been challenged to fill all vacancies. As determined previously, we have now come to a time to reevaluate our committee structure. This is in keeping with the identified goals for this year. We feel it is appropriate to get the congregation's input on this. Rev. Anthony Price will help direct the meeting.

Two building use requests were reviewed and approved. It was noted that Lee Moyer will be leaving the position of Concert committee chair.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Penny Samuelson at 8:40PM.
